EXPERIMENT: THE ABSORBENCY EXPERIMENT

In <u>this episode</u>, Mindy, Guy Raz and Dennis visit the Bathroom Showcase where they learn all about the latest in new toilet technology!

Have you ever wondered which toilet paper has the best absorbency? Absorbency refers to a materials ability to soak up or take in liquids. This simple toilet paper absorbency experiment will help you answer this burning question once and for all.

MATERIALS:

- 1 roll no-name brand toilet paper
- 1 roll name brand toilet paper (e.g. Charmin)

- 2 jars
- water
- rubber bands
- pennies

WOW-TO:

- 1. Tear off a few squares of each brand and set aside.
- 2. Cover the top of your jars with a few squares and use a rubber band to hold the toilet paper in place.
- 3. Once both jars are set up, pour some water through the top of each jar (through the toilet paper on top).
- 4. Gently drop one penny at a time on top of each jar. DO this over and over until the toilet paper breaks.
- 5. What did you observe? Which paper lasted longer before tearing from the weight of the pennies?

ACTIVITY: DIY BIODEGRADABLE SEED STARTER POTS

In <u>this episode</u>, Mindy and Guy Raz investigate the Who, What, When, Where, Why, How, and Wow in the World of SMART TOILETS.

Looking for a fun way to start seedlings? Well than look no further than all those empty toilet paper rolls in the recycling bin! Did you know that they are biodegradable, which makes them perfect to use for seed starter pots. Once the seedlings grow a little, you can go ahead and plant the whole shebang in your planter or garden, seed pot and all.

MATERIALS:

- empty toilet paper rolls
- scissors
- potting soil

- assorted seeds
- water
- a marker for labeling

WOW-TO:

- 1. Gather your materials (if possible set up for this activity outside).
- 2. Cut the toilet paper tubes in half.
- 3. Fold the bottom of each piece of tube in two different ways (horizontally and vertically). You should have four fold lines all the way around and it should look like a square after being folded.
- 4. Cut along each of the four folds, going about an inch in with your scissor on each fold.
- 5. Fold the resulting four flaps inward so that they overlap. This makes a sturdy bottom for your starter pots. Make as many pots as you like.
- 6. Fill each starter pot about 2/3 of the way up with fresh soil.
- 7. Add a few seeds to each pot and cover with a bit more soil.
- 8. If using a variety of different seeds, at this point you may want to label each pot to indicate the contents.
- 9. Sprinkle each starter pot with water and they are ready to go.
